The Greater Memphis Economic Research Group takes an active approach to monitor economic trends and conditions impacting the Greater Memphis region. On May 22nd, 2025, new jobs data for April 2025 was released for metropolitan areas nationwide. Relative to this release, we highlight the updated progress of regional job growth and trends.

Market Update

Job Growth

National job growth was positive for April 2025, with an increase of 0.1%. The Greater Memphis region saw a comparatively large increase of approximately 0.4% in seasonally adjusted nonfarm payroll employment estimates. Accordingly, the regional unemployment rate fell to 3.7% in April, which is below the national rate of 4.2%.

Between March and April 2025, local seasonally adjusted local estimates show an increase of 2,900 jobs.

The Greater Memphis region's local employment estimate for April 2025 is **659,400 jobs**, exceeding pre-pandemic highs.


The April 2025 estimates indicate the market is currently above the pre-pandemic record set in 2020 by 3,600 jobs (0.5%).

As highlighted on the following page, regional growth remains on course compared to major metropolitan areas of similar size and composition. Additionally, industry sector growth is emphasized, illustrating progress in key segments of the regional economy.

Apr. 2024 through Apr. 2025 Seasonally Adjusted






Job growth among peer metro areas slowed through 2024, following the rapid rebound seen in 2022.

Of the four peer cities analyzed, only Louisville experienced a slight decline in job growth in April 2025.

Given recent restructuring announcements from major employers, and fluctuations in government employment, these ongoing patterns of growth speak to the strength of private industry.

Tennessee grew by 8,600 jobs (0.3%) in April 2025. Year-over-year, the state gained 24,000 jobs (+0.7%) compared to April 2024, according to the latest data release.

Employment changes in April saw most industries trending positively. However, the Education & Health sector rallied to grow 2.26% following an unusual decline in March. In contrast, the Construction sector declined by -0.66%, followed by Manufacturing at -0.38%.

On a year-over-year basis, the Education & Health sector performed well, growing by nearly 2%, while the Construction industry declined by -3.52% compared to April 2024. Additionally, the other services sector (which includes personal services) has shown consistent growth through 2024 and into 2025, reflecting rising consumer confidence and a greater willingness to spend.

NOTE: The Bureau of Labor Statistics (BLS) Current Employment Statistics (CES) program have revised employment data to reflect the incorporation of the latest benchmarks and the recalculation of seasonal adjustment factors. This process affects not seasonally adjusted data from April 2022 to December 2023 and seasonally adjusted data from January 2019 to December 2023. This will impact our figures moving forward in 2024 by providing a more accurate and up-to-date baseline for employment trends. Job Market Demand

In April 2025, 33,776 jobs were posted in the Memphis MSA. Of these, 12,749 (38%) were determined to be unique and not duplicative of another live posting. This is a slight decrease of 1.2% versus March 2025's 12,913 unique

As a result of the current 3.7% unemployment rate, 23,583 individuals are available for work. This equates to 1.8 unemployed persons per unique job posting.

Among the 12,749 unique job postings, only 4,781 (38%) included salary information. The median advertised salary was \$25.54 per hour, identical to February's 2025 median.

Compared to April 2024, there were 204 more unique job postings (1.6%) and the median advertised wage rose by \$2.19 (+9.3%) year-overvear.
